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FOREWORD

This year, from September 8th to 14th, Edinburgh will be host to the Sixth International Congress of Genealogy and Heraldry. On the initiative of the Secretary to the Congress, it was decided to use this occasion for a special display of the Heraldic Stained Glass in which The Burrell Collection is so rich. The Museums and Art Galleries Committee of the Corporation endorsed the suggestion and Mr. William Wells, Keeper of the Collection, has arranged the exhibition and has written this catalogue. These are formidable tasks calling for specialised display on the one hand and detailed research on the other. We hope that the reward will be a wider general interest in both the historical and artistic aspects of a fascinating subject besides providing a feast of colour for all our visitors.

Thanks are due to David Reid of Robertland for the suggestion that Glasgow should show the Burrell heraldic glass, also for advice on books and help in identifying Nos. 11 and 62 in the catalogue. INTRODUCTION

Of the five hundred and eighty-seven windows and panels of stained glass acquired by Sir William and Lady Burrell and now forming part of the Burrell Collection, over half are heraldic, and a number of others, though not exclusively heraldic, are of some heraldic interest. Some of these have been included in this catalogue although they could equally well appear in a catalogue of figure subjects.

The collection seems to have been chiefly formed from about 1920 onwards. In 1944 when the gift was made, two hundred and forty-three panels of religious and heraldic glass were in the windows of Sir William's house near Berwick-on-Tweed, Hutton Castle. A few of these were removed in 1948 for a special exhibition in Glasgow, but the majority remained there until 1956 when all were taken out and transferred to Glasgow with the exception of those in the bedrooms and sitting rooms still in use and these were not transferred until March, 1962, about nine months after the death of Lady Burrell.

In addition to the glass in the windows at Hutton Castle, there was a quantity of stained glass in store there. Moreover, Sir William added considerably to the Collection after 1944 and the purchases he made between this date and that of his death in March, 1958, included some of the most impressive of the heraldic glass—the series from Vale Royal acquired in 1947 and the even larger and more homogeneous series from Fawsley Hall in 1950.


The basis of the present catalogue is a typescript inventory. Like the inventories which exist for other parts of the Collection this was probably drawn up primarily for insurance purposes, but unlike them it contains, or part of it contains, considerably more information than they usually do. This at least applies to the first

two hundred and forty-three entries which is a room to room list of the stained glass as set up in the windows of Hutton Castle, not only in the living rooms, but in the bedrooms, servants' quarters, and even the bathrooms. Most of the heraldic glass in this section of the inventory is quite copiously described and annotated, but is disappointingly reticent as to the date when each piece was acquired and where it came from, and it was presumably drawn up at a time when this information had already been forgotten, or maybe there still remained reasons for suppressing it. There is nothing to indicate the authorship of the document of which the inventory is a typed and perhaps partly incomplete version, but there can be no doubt that the information derives from Mr. Wilfred Drake, from whom, either on his own or in partnership with Mr. Grosvenor Thomas, most of the glass was purchased. The glass listed as in store at Hutton Castle is very briefly itemised. The subsequent entries for glass purchased after 1944 are again fuller and always record the date and the name of the dealer, but frequently omit the name of the house from which the glass derived. All in all the inventory may be described as a comparatively lavish but haphazard and erratic source of information.

The half-tone illustrations reproduced here show the glass as arranged for the exhibition of heraldic art in the Burrell Collection displayed in the Glasgow Art Gallery during August and September, 1962. For this purpose the glass was mounted in twenty-four artifically lighted cases represented in this catalogue by the forty-eight black and white reproductions each of which shows half a case. With some exceptions, the arrangement is according to country of origin, the British being followed by the Flemish, German, Swiss and Dutch. The arrangement of the British glass is for the most part according to date, but this has been waived

where a rigid adherence to chronology conflicted with some other consideration. Wherever possible, for example, glass from the same house, though of varying date, has been kept together as a series.

Outstanding among the latter is the series of forty shields from the banqueting hall at Fawsley Hall, near Daventry in Northamptonshire, the residence of the ancient family of Knightley from 1416, until the death of Rainald, Baron Knightley of Fawsley in 1895, when the estate was inherited by his cousin, Lord Gage, whose mother was a Knightley. In so far as the stained glass is concerned the key-figure in this pedigree is Sir Edmund Knightley, who is believed to have rebuilt the house at Fawsley between 1537 and 1542 (the year of his death) and to have embellished it with the armorial glass now in the Burrell Collection, among which his own shield with the Knightley quarterings impaling De Vere must have taken pride of place. His marriage with Ursula, sister and coheiress of John Vere, Earl of Oxford, accounts for the presence in the house of the eight contemporary roundels commemorating the ancestry of his wife. His own ancestry is recorded in the more or less rectangular panels with hour-glass shaped shields set amidst foliage and other fertile decoration. A number of these are specifically concerned with his mother's maternal descent. His father, the third Knightley of Fawsley, had been made a Knight of the Bath when the future Henry VIII was created Duke of York, an honour which probably lends special significance to the four rectangular panels with royal arms and the cross of St. George. Also in the house were four ornate medallions, two of which bear the arms of Sir Edmund's brother and successor—Sir Valentine (died 1566), who married Anne Ferrers, and of his brother-in-law, Sir William Spencer of Althorp. These are both dated 1572 and were perhaps added by Sir Valentine's son, Sir Richard Knightley, who died in 1615 aged eighty-two, and whose arms and those of his wife, Mary Fermor, also figure in this part of the series, of which




the fourth is for Henry VIII and Jane Seymour (Sir Richard's second wife was a Seymour). Undated but perhaps also added by Sir Richard are the three garter medallions, one of which is certainly for William Parr, Earl of Essex, brother of Katherine Parr.

A few years earlier Sir William had acquired another series of hardly less interest, although it is typical of the erratic nature of the inventory that no certain indication is given there of the provenance of the thirty-seven medallions and pane's it lists as having been acquired from Mr. Wilfred Drake in August, 1947. Whereas the Fawsley Hall series is very much centred in a single family, the Vale Royal one forms a county rather than a family unit, commemorating as it does a number of the landed gentry of Cheshire about the middle of the 16th Century. Some of these modest little armorial panels almost certainly came originally from Spurstow Hall where seven of them (Brereton, Brereton of Malpas, Ridley, Spurstow, Done, Kinderton, and Cholmondeley) were recorded by a contemporary antiquarian in 1599 (B. M. Harl. MS. 2151). Others probably come from Utkinton Hall, the home of the Done family, hereditary master Foresters of Delamere Forest. In 1755 the shields from both these houses were in the windows of Tarporley Rectory. It so happened that when the Reverend William Cole, friend of Horace Walpole and indefatigable recorder of antiquities, came to visit the Reverend John Allen, rector of Tarporley, he had the misfortune to break his leg as the result of a fall from his horse on the way. While convalescing in the house Cole made drawings with annotations of all the stained glass shields which were in the windows there. The drawings of the thirty-three panels made by Cole are now among the Cole manuscripts in the British Museum and of these eleven are now in the Burrell Collection (Minshull, Wilbraham, Holford, Done (2), Ridley, Ardern, Cholmondeley, Spurstow, Brereton of Malpas and

Kinderton). Cole noted that while some of the shields were large and ancient "with Raies behind the Shield and the Name under " (he mistakenly attributed them to the 15th Century, half a century or more too early) others were comparatively small and modern (about the time of Charles II, which is probably about half a century too late). Two of the sesmall modern panels, one for Ardern and the other for John Done of Flaxyards and Utkinton who died in 1601 are among those in the Collection. (Whereas the earlier of these shields are in pot metal *i.e.* glass stained by mixing a variety of metallic oxides with the substance of the glass with the addition only of black enamel paint and a yellow pigment applied to the surface of the glass these later panels are wholly painted in translucent enamel pigments on white *i.e.* colourless glass).

After Mr. Allen's death in 1778, the Tarporley Rectory glass was apparently dismantled and a selection must have been acquired by the Cholmondeley family for Vale Royal, a mansion built after 1542 on the site of the ancient monastery. Here they joined a distinct series of armorial medallions, some for royalty, some for knights of the garter, which presumably were introduced into the house as an act of homage to the king and the leading nobility. Among them, however, were a few oval wreathed medallions for some of the most prominent Cheshire families (Booth, Venables, Brereton) which also figure in the humbler type of shields from Spurstow and Utkinton. All this glass remained at Vale Royal at least until 1922 when it was described by J. Paul Rylands and R. Stewart-Brown in two articles in The Genealogist (Vol. 38). A few of the panels recorded by Cole at Tarporley Rectory and now in the Burrell Collection were noted by the authors of these articles as "not at Vale Royal" and were presumably not accessible to them at the time. A few others also noted as " not at Vale Royal " were acquired for the Burrell Collection prior to 1944 and these may have been acquired by Drake from an unspecified source.




Spurstow Hall, 1599.

(Quarterings not blazoned in the catalogue are given in the index)

1 BEATRIX VAN VALKENBURG (d. 1277); daughter of Dirk II, Lord of Valkenburg (Limburg) and third wife of Richard, Earl of Cornwall, King of the Romans. She is kneeling and wears a mantle (harry gules and sable). In the blue surround are a number of roundels charged with an Imperial Eagle, three of the upper roundels being partly obliterated by a white letter inscription: Beatrix de Valkenburch Regina Allemannie. Shaped panel; pot metal; some silver yellow stain (probably a replacement); 24X 10J in. Oxford School, late 13th Century. Probably from the Church of the Minorites, Oxford, where she was buried. 
It is not certain that the red and black bars on the mantle should be interpreted as a blazon. They are not the arms of either her father or her husband.

According to the inventory these are the arms of John Howard (1430-1485) 1st Duke of Norfolk the Yorkist leader, who was killed at Bosworth field in 1485 fighting for Richard III. He was descended by his mother, a Mowbray, from Thomas de Brotherton, Earl of Norfolk, second son of Edward I—hence the lions of England in the second and third quarters.



John de Vere (1442-1512-13), 13th Earl of Oxford, the Lancastrian leader at the Battle of Bosworth, was son of Elizabeth, daughter and heiress of Sir John Howard, grandfather of Sir John Howard, 1st Duke of Norfolk (see no. 6). They were therefore first cousins. He died at Hedingham Castle, for which it is supposed these two panels were made.








This and the three following medallions probably derive from the "great treasure trove of ancient art" acquired by R. C. Lucas, the sculptor, who became posthumously famous when a bust of Flora, bought by the Berlin Museum as a work by Leonardo da Vinci was declared to be his creation. He used the stained glass which he believed to have come from Nonsuch Palace to adorn a house which he built near Chilworth (see An Account of a Residence designed and built by R. C. Lucas, Sculptor, 1854). A similar roundel with the arms of Henry VIII and Jane Seymour within a chaplet of red and white roses from the Lucas and Radford Collections was acquired by the Victoria and Albert Museum, London (reproduced as frontispiece to A History of English Glass-Painting by Maurice Drake, 1912).

Sir Thomas Wentworth (1591-1667) of Nettlestead, succeeded his father, the third lord, in 1593, and was knighted in 1610. He married, firstly, Anne (d. 1637/8), one of the seven daughters of Sir John Crofts, by Mary, daughter of Sir Thomas Shirley, before 1612. In 1614, he inherited the estate of Toddington in Bedfordshire and left his seat at Nettlestead to settle there. The Crofts were an old-established Suffolk family, of Saxham Parva and Wiston. The Wentworth quarterings as listed above are the same as those of the 2nd Lord Wentworth of Nettlestead (d. 1584) as they appear (with some variations in the order and the repetition of one) in a shield, quarterly of twenty, carved on the stone gateway of Nettlestead Hall (see W. L. Rutton, Three Branches of the Family of Wentworth, 1891). The names listed as alternative identifications in brackets are those given in the Burrell Inventory (presumably by Drake). This and the six following medallions are from Saxham Hall, the seat of the Croft family in Suffolk. They were acquired by Grosvenor Thomas and Drake frem Dr. Fhilip Nelson. 

These quarries and nos. 246 and 248 were probably painted for Sir Samuel Peyton of Knowlton Court (near Deal in Kent) where the Church of St. Clement contains several monuments to the family. A 15th Century ancestor, Thomas Peyton, High Sheriff of Cambridgeshire in 1443, 1453 and 1478, married Margaret, daughter of Sir John Bernard, who appears as a kneeling donor with her husband in one of

the windows in Long Melford Church, Suffolk. He married secondly, Margaret, daughter and co-heir of Sir Hugh Franceys of Giffards Hall in Wickhambrook (see no. 246 below). By his first marriage Thomas Peyton acquired the Isleham estate in Cambridgeshire, where the church contains a monumental brass to him and his two wives, as well as several 16th century Peyton monuments. The Beaupre, Rich and Clere impalements in no. 244 represent the wives of an uncle, a great uncle and great grandfather of Sir Samuel Peyton of Knowlton. The third quarry is for Sir Christopher Peyton, Kt. of S. Edmund's Bury, Auditor of Ireland, who married Anne, daughter of William Palmer. Esq., of co. Warwick.
